AdobeSparkEDU offers a tool for building websites. Very user-friendly, with a variety of layouts and features to support uploaded projects, images, video, writing, and more.

<u>Weebly</u>

Offers a free version to educators; easy to use; maintain privacy; similar functionality and features as Google Sites
